


Mobility Authority Historical Toll Tag Usage






Industry Toll Tag Usage Rates for 2017

Intended for infrequent users


Ideal for users that don't want a tag but want to avoid the hassle of a bill Provides lowest cost and most convenience for frequent toll road users



Simplified Billing & Decreased Fees

CURRENT - Every 15 days Toll Bill Tolls + \$16 2nd Notice of Non-Payment Tolls + \$31 **Final Notice / Collections** Tolls + \$61 Max admin fee / invoice = \$61 Max assessed fee / yr = \$1,464

The new Pay By Mail program results in a 63% decrease in administrative fees possible for unpaid invoices

Hold Non-payers Accountable

- Increase number of criminal complaint submissions for Failure to Pay Toll
- Implement habitual violator remedies for egregious violators (Agenda Item #8)
 - Name publication
 - Vehicle registration block
 - Vehicle prohibition



Staff Recommendation

- To incentive tag usage and increase industry standing:
 - ✓Increase Pay By Mail toll rate premium to 50% as of Jan 1, 2019
 - Reward early payers by offering 33% instead of 50% (summer 2019)
 - Offer current 33% toll rate premium to registered PBM account holders
- To improve the customer experience:
 - ✓ Approve Registered Account Parameters
 - ✓ Approve proposed Schedule of Fees and Charges
 - ✓ Approve proposed *Billing Schedule*

Adopt a Habitual Violator Policy for the implementation of new toll enforcement remedies and approve corresponding amendments to the Mobility Authority Policy Code



Habitual Violator Legislation

In 2013 the Texas Legislature enacted into law new toll enforcement remedies aimed at Habitual Violators. As defined by the Texas Transportation Code 372, toll entities may pursue remedies to prohibit use of toll roads, deny vehicle registration, and impound vehicles which continue to violate the prohibition of toll use.



Habitual Violator Qualification

- Issued 2 notices of nonpayment
 - that contain (in aggregate) 100 or more events of nonpayment within 365 days
 - contain a warning that the failure to pay the amounts specified may result in the toll project entity's exercise of habitual violator remedies
- Have not paid the full total amount due for tolls and administrative fees under those notices

Habitual Violator Enforcement Remedies

- After unsuccessful appeal by customer and upon approval by CTRMA Board:
 - Publish prohibited owner info name, city and state of residence, total number of events of nonpayment, and total amount due for the tolls and admin fees.
 - Send Notice of Prohibition Order to registered owner(s) banning use of CTRMA's toll facilities.
 - A peace officer may detain a motor vehicle observed by the officer to be operated in violation of the prohibition order.
 - Place a hold on the vehicle's registration.



Habitual Violator Implementation Timeline

- September 27: Board approves habitual violator policy
- October 15: Habitual violator advisory letters issued
- November 14: Advisory response deadline
- November 16: Habitual violator pre-determination letters mailed
- December 17: Deadline for pre-determination customer appeal
- December 19: Board approval of habitual violator final determination
- January 2019: Notices of Prohibition, name publication and registration holds implemented
- February 2019: Road enforcement begins



Staff Recommendation

- Adopt habitual violator enforcement remedies
- Amend Section 301.10 Violation Enforcement Remedies of the Authority's Policy Code



About the North East Texas RMA

- Established in October 2004
- Independent government agency created to accelerate the development of transportation projects in North East Texas
- Governed by a 19-member board of directors
- Projects include Toll 49 in Tyler and other projects in the 12-county region

Gregg County Smith County Van Zandt County






CTRMA & NET RMA Partnership

- In 2013 the CTRMA Board approved an interlocal agreement with NET RMA for electronic toll transaction processing and video toll collection services through the Mobility Authority's third-party vendors.
 - Services provided by Schneider Electric and MSB
 - Performed on a pass-through basis at zero cost to the Mobility Authority
- The agreement was extended in 2015







CTRMA & NET RMA Partnership

- In July 2018 the NET RMA Board approved a new ILA with CTRMA for electronic toll transaction processing, video toll collection and image review services
 - Services provided by Kapsch TrafficCom, USA and Cofiroute USA, LLC
 - Performed on a pass-through basis at zero cost to the Mobility Authority

 Approve the execution of an interlocal agreement with the North East Texas RMA for electronic and video toll collection transaction processing and image review services Justin Word, P.E., Director of Engineering



Approve a contract and work authorization for construction engineering and inspection services, approve a work authorization for general engineering consultant services, and approve a contingency budget for construction phase professional services for the Manor Expressway (290E) Phase III Project



Project Summary

- Total Project Cost \$127M
- Funding Sources
 - CTRMA \$85.9M
 - TxDOT \$41.1M
- Construction start fall 2018
- Open to tolling summer of 2021





Proposed Action

- Execution of a construction engineering and inspection (CE&I) contract and work authorization with HDR, Inc.
- Execution of a work authorization for general engineering consulting (GEC) services
- Creation of a contingency budget to manage construction phase services
- Budget covers from fall 2018 through final acceptance of the project

- Staff requests Board approval of the resolution




Cashflow Analysis






Project Manpower Curve (Current Schedule vs. Last Updated Schedule)

183 North Project Description




183 North Mobility Project

- Two express lanes in each direction
- Widening to four non-tolled lanes in each direction
- Bike and pedestrian facilities
- Approx. 9-miles in length, including all transitions

Project Purpose

- Facilitate congestion management in the corridor
- Provide reliable route for transit
- Facilitate reliable emergency response



183 North Project History



Previous Actions

CAMPO

- Lists US 183 North corridor as one of the top congested roadways
- Prioritized a funding allocation of \$7.2 million for preliminary work (December 13, 2011)

Mobility Authority

- Environmental Clearance (April 26, 2016)
- Primacy (April 26, 2017)

TxDOT

- Extension of primacy
 - April 2019 Advertisement of Procurement
 - October 2020 Enter into Contract for Construction








Travis County Transit Development Plan

Case Study Examples: Tollways and Transit



Best Practices

- Include transit components starting in planning phase
 - Park & Ride facilities
 - Convenient access for buses
 - Level of service (route and schedule)
- Potential funding partnership options
 - Delivery of planning, engineering and construction
 - ROW
 - Direct access ramps
 - Park & Ride facility capital cost

VIA Stone Oak Park & Ride & US 281 HOV



- Nearly 400 parking space garage and passenger amenities
- Future direct access ramps/ flyovers to be constructed by TxDOT to US 281 HOV lanes (2021)
- **\$28.3M**
- \$5 one-way fare
- 30 minute frequency



Woodlands Express Park & Ride (Houston)



- 3 Park & Rides (1,200 spaces each)
- 3 Destination Areas
- Fare: \$13 round trip
- **2**,400+ daily riders
- Frequent bus service:
 - 5 to 10 minute frequency
 - 40+ trips per day

A Comfortable, Convenient, and Economical Commute



Miami-Dade Expressway Authority (MDX) Partnership



- Dolphin Park & Ride Terminal Facility
 - Nearly 900 spaces
 - \$17M construction cost
 - Funding partnership
 - Miami-Dade Transit Express bus service and O&M
 - MDX ROW; delivery of planning, ENV clearance and design
 - FDOT 50% construction cost + development costs
 - Miami-Dade County 50% construction cost



Denver US 36 Express Lanes and Bus Rapid Transit



- Flatiron Flyer Bus Rapid Transit Service
 - 18 mile service between Boulder and Denver
 - 6 integrated Park & Rides
 - Range from 260 to 1300 spaces
 - Bus-only ramps to the express lanes
 - \$4.50 one-way fare
 - Buses every 4 to 15 minutes
 - 14,000+ daily riders



Atlanta I-85 Express Lanes & Express Bus



- 2 new Park & Ride lots plus 2 lease locations
 - Nearly 2,500 total spaces
- \$3 to \$4 one-way fare
- 20 to 30 minute frequency/ route
- 3,200+ daily boardings (8 routes)
- Park & Rides at 70%+ utilization


Only 2% of the vehicles in the I-85 Express Lanes are Express Commuter Coaches, but they are responsible for over 26% of the people throughput.

- "Ride Transit Earn Toll Credits" Program
 - \$2 toll credit per transit use
 - Up to \$10 in credits/ month




