




Park and Ride Overview

» Background

- » Memorandum of Agreement for regional park and ride development with Capital Metro and CAMPO approved by Board in 2016
- Met with community officials to identify priority areas
- » Developed list of short- and long-term areas for consideration near Mobility Authority corridors
- » Conducted preliminary analysis of potential sites

» Current Priority Locations

- » Howard Station/Expansion
- » MoPac South
- » Manor
- » Lakeline Station/Expansion





Park and Ride Status



» Passage of Project Connect has reinforced the community's commitment to transit

- Several Metro Express routes on Mobility Authority facilities were included in Project Connect
- Existing park and ride facilities will need to be expanded and new facilities constructed to complete the vision of Project Connect
- There has been a significant increase in Metro Express ridership on the MoPac Express Lane routes
- » The federal government is contemplating a major boost to infrastructure funding
 - The Mobility Authority could be positioned to help compete for federal funds that may permit expedited construction of park and ride facilities adjacent to agency toll roads
- » Board approved \$150,000 for Park and Ride development in FY 2022



Park and Ride Strategy

» Procure an engineering firm to provide Park and Ride Facility Development Services

- » Request for Proposals (RFQ) issued on May 24, 2021
- » One Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) received by June 11 deadline
- » Due diligence conducted to ensure the process was reasonable
- » Selection Committee reviewed and scored SOQ submitted by The Goodman Corporation
- Selection Committee conducted interview with The Goodman Corporation and finalized scores
- The Goodman Corporation was determined to be qualified to perform the services requested



Proposed Work Plan

- » Goodman Corporation will support process needed to prepare Grant Readiness Package for one park and ride site in FY 2022
 - » Site development agreement
 - » Site planning
 - » Demand analysis
 - » Traffic study
 - » Environmental documentation
 - » Cost estimates
 - » Cost benefit analysis
 - » Site schematics and renderings



Construction Inspection

- Procured through a qualifications-based selection conducted in 2015
- Notice to Proceed December 28, 2015
- Original schedule through November 2019
- » Addendum in March 2020 to extend through March 2021
- Current action extends services through December 2021

ATKINS General Engineering Consulting

- Procured through a qualificationsbased selection conducted in 2009 and again in 2017
- » Notice to Proceed for 183S oversight August 2015
- Original schedule through January 2020
- » Current action extends services through December 2021



Recommendation

» Staff recommends approval of this item, proposed Amendment No. 3 to the original contract, which will provide an additional not to exceed fee of \$520,000 to extend construction inspection services on the 183 South Project through the scheduled completion of the Project in December 2021.

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



Action Background



Sept 2018

Mobility Authority Board approved a habitual violator program



July 2019

Executive Director authorized to negotiate / execute ILAs with Travis & Williamson County for habitual violator road enforcement services



Dec 2020

Staff began conversations with TCSO personnel for habitual violator road enforcement services in Travis County

Board approved the purchase of automated license plate readers (ALPR) technology to support law enforcement's detention of prohibited vehicles

June 2019

Williamson County approved an ILA with the Mobility Authority for habitual violator road enforcement services (renewed in Dec 2020)

Additional ALPR technology deployed on 183S, 290 and MoPac Express Lane

Policy Code Changes

» 401.0061 Discretionary Exemptions

A contract to purchase general goods or services that may be exempted under Section 262.024, Local Government Code, from competitive bidding or competitive proposal requirements otherwise made applicable to a county by the County Purchasing Act may be exempted from competitive bidding or competitive proposal requirements established by Article 3 of this chapter if the board exempts the contract by motion or resolution.

Procurement of the following items, services or leases may be exempted from competitive bidding or competitive proposal requirements established in Chapter 4 if the board approves the exemption by motion or resolution:

- a) Items, services or leases that may be exempted from competitive bidding or competitive proposal requirements under Section 262.024, Local Government Code; and
- b) Law enforcement services.



Travis County Sheriff's Office Contract Overview

- » The Mobility Authority will contract for prohibited vehicle enforcement services via the Travis County Sheriff's Office's (TCSO) Secondary Employment Application
- » The term of the proposed contract shall terminate on January 1st; execution of a new agreement is required by TCSO for continued services
- » The agreement may be terminated with 24 hour notice to TCSO
- » Hourly Rates Officer @ \$76 / hr (min 4 hrs.); vehicle @ \$20 / hr (min 2 hrs.)
- » The total FY 2022 NTE cost for TCSO services is \$250,000



Staff Recommendation

- Staff recommends amending the Policy Code to exempt agreements for road enforcement services from competitive bidding or competitive proposal requirements
- Staff also recommends authorizing the executive director to enter into agreements with the Travis County Sheriff's Office for habitual violator road enforcement services





- » Project Description: The project includes a 5.3-mile northern extension of the existing 10-mile 183A Toll Road
- »Limits: Hero Way to north of SH 29
- » Total Project Cost: \$277M
- » Construction Cost: \$175M
- » Notice to Proceed: 3/28/2021
- » Open to Tolling: Early 2025
















183 North Mobility Project



- » Project Description: 9-mile Express Lane Project along US 183; GP Lane improvements; DCs at MoPac
- » Limits: SH 45 to MoPac
- » Total Project Cost: \$612M
- » Design/Build Cost: \$477.1M
- » Notice to Proceed: NTP1 Issued 4/15/2021; NTP2/3 issued 6/28/2021
- » Open to Tolling: Early 2026



Project Status

»Design Activities

- » Project is currently in design. 30% Design submittals expected to commence in September
- » Field activities are limited to geotechnical borings, SUE investigations, and survey (all to support design)

»Permitting:

» WPAP permit is on the critical path to commence construction activities. Design to support permit submittal is ongoing.

»Construction:

» Construction expected to commence in 4th Quarter 2021



Initial Construction Activities

»Initial construction activities will include:

- » Installation of High Mast Lighting
- » Initial diamond grinding of general-purpose lanes (NGCS)
- » Median earthwork and drainage activities to support express lanes






Weekly Transaction Trend (Excluding 183 Toll)



Weekly Transaction Trend (All Roads)




Weekly Transaction Trend by Roadway Since COVID

Avg # of Daily Calls Received Versus Time to Answer (by Month)




Call Center Performance (April 2021)

Data Platform System Overview

- »CTRMA has defined a multi-faceted strategic plan to implement an end-to-end scalable tolling transaction processing system to meet current and future business capabilities known as the Data Platform System or DPS
- » The back-office architecture design provides solutions for:
 - » Centralized, secure, and redundant data hosting for all data entities necessary for toll transaction processing
 - » External data exchange points that provide flexible structured transaction data transmissions to and from third parties
 - » Multi-step modular pricing and discounting business logic
 - » Auditable data governance and security
 - » UX/UI-driven data and business process administration
 - » Public, external, and internal fixed reporting and cached data access

Item Overview

- » Apigee, part of Google Cloud, is a platform for developing and managing application programming interfaces (APIs) interfaces that make it easy for one application to consume capabilities or data from another application.
- » Google Looker is a business intelligence software and big data analytics platform that facilitates the exploration, analysis and sharing of real-time business analytics easily.
- » Procured through DIR: Contract #DIR-TSO-4162
- » Product: Google Cloud Enterprise Agreement for Public Sector
- » Term: 12-month subscription
- » Estimated subscription term: September 1, 2021 thru August 31, 2022
- » Cost: \$161,112 / 12 mos.



Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends approving the purchase of Google Apigee and Looker software subscriptions from DIR vendor Carahsoft Technologies through the Texas Department of Information Resources Cooperative Contracts Program in support of the Mobility Authority's data platform host project.





Staff Recommendation

- » Approval of a Vehicle Prohibition Order for the identified habitual violator customers.
 - » Number of prohibited vehicles: 689
 - » Total number of unpaid tolls: 373,126
 - Average number of outstanding tolls per vehicle: 540
 - Average unpaid balance: \$883.60

- Customers found to be in violation of prohibition are subject to warning, citation with up to \$500 fine and/or vehicle impoundment
